

ISSUES IN INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL JUSTICE

CALL FOR PAPERS

The editors of the ICCSN journal, *Issues in International Criminal Justice (IICJ)*, welcome submissions for the Journal's next edition, which will be a special edition commemorating the 10 year anniversary of the ICCSN.

This IICJ edition will focus on different theories of justice and the question of "what is justice," as originally posed by Plato.

The question "what is justice" is a question of personal interest for each one, and not a problem of abstract morality. – Plato, The Republic

Plato reserves a prominent place to the idea of *dikaisyne* or "justice." *Dikaisyne* is closely associated with the Greek words for morality or righteousness, and covers an individual's conduct that affects others. Plato developed his own theory of justice pursuant to which justice is a social consciousness that makes the individual internally harmonious, thereby contributing to the harmony of society.

Topics of interest for submission include, but are not limited to:

- Transitional justice, rehabilitation and reconciliation
- Women, justice and peace
- The Importance of "ownership of the justice process"
- Criminal liability for mass atrocities as a deterrent - does it work? (including in respect to North Korea, Syria and Libya)
- International criminal law and corporate liability

Submissions should include a brief biography (150 words max.) and an abstract (400 words max) to be sent no later than March 15, 2016 to iccsn@iccsn.com.

Successful applicants will be notified by April 30, 2016.

In order to be considered for publication in the *IICJ*, successful applicants must submit a complete paper (4000 words max) by June 30, 2016.
